From the obscure to the wellloved and liked, it's all contained in these vo pages. An album that will surely be one of the year's finest would have to be Ronny Lee's superb 'Original Retro'. Little is known about Mr Lee, but that will all be rectified by next issue when we deliver the full skinny on your next favourite AOR star. With the news that the mighty **Seven** have reformed and recorded an album for Escape, it's been, as our American friends would say. another doozy of a month.

Having released their debut album on '08, Finnish AORsters Free Spirit return with a splendid sophomore outing in the shape of 'All The Shades Of Darkened Light'. An eleven-track romp, it will come across like a Def Leppard greatest hits package, such is their similarity. With the likes of Grand Design and Loud Lion doing this kind of thing, and doing it well, it would have to be something special to rival either outfit. And special it is, let me tell you.

They've captured the eighties Def Leppard sound to a tee, almost to the point of cloning Sheffield's finest. Like Reckless Love, they've managed to inject the right amount of originality into an old formula and come up with something that although it isn't new, it is damn easy on the ears. They showed an awful lot of promise on their debut, but this trumps i and then some. This is one of the best releases this month Over at Escape they've put

together a package that will take some beating this year. The band is **Diesel**, the album is called 'Into The Fire', and it happens to be one of the best things I've heard this month. Putting Robert Hart together with Jim Kirkpatrick (FM) was a masterstroke, and the end results speak for themselves. With Steve Overland on

backing vocals, it's not a million miles away from the recent Overland album, only with more of a blues edge to it. As with **FM**, Kirkpatrick plays up a storm on this album; he must surely be one of this country's most underrated players? He's injected flair into recent FM material and British hard rock at its absolute finest. Eat Whatever guise they are under,

whether it is Square One or Someone

Else's Life, the Aussie melodic rockers The Radio Sun have always delivered quality albums. The core duo of Jason Old (Safire) and Steve Janevski have, from their days in Square One, been right at the heart of things until the present day. In the past they've been renowned for their tight, lush harmonies, and nothing's changed on this album. Entitled 'Wrong Things Right', it's been produced by Paul Laine and will rate highly with lovers of their past works. Just one listen to the likes of 'World's Crazy Now', 'Julie' and the irresistible 'Summer Girl' and you'll be caught - hook, line and sinker. Like their past works, this is the perfect soundtrack to hot summers and lazy

released a fabulous five-track EP and there's not a Y&T cover in sight! The opening couplet of 'Run' and 'Caroline' are immense slabs of AOR, both uplifting and surging, that contain a fine balance of guitars and keys, with the latter having an irresistible chorus and hook line Getting Dan Reed to help out on the balladic 'Peace In Your Heart' will raise their profile, whilst 'Higher Than We Can' is a fantastic end to a great EP.

A nice little reissue of 'Warriors Of Love' by Gideon's Army comes your way this month courtesy of Retroactive Records. Formed in '73, it would be nearly a decade later before they released their debut album in '82. With a further three years until this, their sophomore album, hit the stores, they weren't the most prolific of bands. Originally only ever available on vinyl, 'Warriors Of Love' is very much of its time and, if I'm honest, hasn't aged that well. If you like bands such as Servant, The Rez Band or early Sweet Comfort Band, then you will find plenty to like on this release. This is one for completists or die-hard Christian AOR fans only, I'm afraid.

Of which the likes of 'Futurama' and 'Cold Hearted' come replete with the usual FM trademarks whilst 'Bad That's Good In You' is a blues-based rocker. This is their third release and I have to say that they are getting progressively better, but they are hardly going to set the world on fire.

As a member of the Norwegian outfit **Seks**, the man that is **Vitne** recorded a dreadful little album and, if I'm honest, 'Neon' isn't that far behind. The pairing of Vitne and Angel is, incredulously, being described in some quarters as a modern day Billy Idol and Stevie Stevens. Whilst Angel is no Stevens, he does know his way around a guitar; Vitne, on the other hand, couldn't carry a tune if it was in a suitcase. A flat vocal delivery is only a part of the problem; couple it with an album full of shambolic songs and you've a recipe for disaster. Avoid, like the plaque!

The sweet sounds of Justin Lerner are washing over the New Jersey shoreline via his debut EP, '18th Avenue'. A six-track affair, it showcases Lerner's love of all things Springsteen and Bon Jovi. Not that dissimilar to what Blue Tears were doing on their 'Innocent Ones' album, Lerner has a knack for carrying a great tune. You can imagine him belting these songs out at the Stone Pony or some other legendary New Jersey venue, enthralling the crowd effortlessly with the likes of '18th Avenue', 'Summer Days Ain't Over' and 'Not This Time'. This guy has massive potential and will appeal to fans of Highway 9, Ghost Poets and Blue Tears. Have a look at www.justinlernermusic.com. One of my most endearing images

of LA metal queen Ann Boleyn was that of her on the back cover of Hellion's track debut EP - flanked by her band, a long lasting appeal. looking like she was holding them back an image that put her up there with the likes of Lee Aaron and Doro Pesch in my book. With Cherry Red releasing a brand new Anthology, 'To Hellion And Back', it's the perfect time to get reacquainted with this most endearing of metal quintets. Spread over two CDs, this anthology covers all the bases. From the debut EP right up to their present-day incarnation, it's all included here. Personally, I love their debut EP; it very blandiose. Over at Rock Candy they've show cases a band that should have done so much more.

The Brazilian outfit Pleaser have the kind of style and look that belongs on the sunset strip circa '89. Their debut album, 'One Night In Paradise', is full of the kind of cliché ridden rubbish that destroyed hair metal in the first place. From the cover art to the woeful lyrical content, this is the kind of album that would make

one singles and delivered some of the best music to come out of the States. I all started in '78 when a soft rocking, innocuous looking album spawned a top five hit in the shape of 'Hold The Line'. I perennial song, it proved to be a real tour-de-force that springboarded the band to bigger and better things.

By the time of their sophomore album, 'Hydra', the band were in ful swing as their brand of pomp



assed image, to the ludicrous band names - step forward Slaver, Hell, Crown and Axel – this album is doomed before they even play a note. Once again, like the Pleaser album, this is hai metal by numbers and does nothing more than irritate me to the point of distraction. Oh well, at least now I have a matching pair of silver coasters

Over at Frontiers the new Winger album, 'Better Day's Comin', has caught my attention, which, considering they contain two of the rudest men in rock, is no mean feat. Still, it's all about the music, right? And this sounds quite good in my humble opinion. The titular 'Better Day's Comin' is a particularly pleasant and very seventies inspired song, whilst 'Midnight Driver Of A Love Machine' is just like the Winger of old. Of particular beauty is the track 'Ever Wonder', which sounds like it could have come from any of Kip's solo albums. This is a great

album, a real slow-burner that will have Also on Frontiers is 'Gravitas', the new album from **Asia**, and its business as usual. If I'm honest, I think that Asia have past their sell-by date and made a huge mistake in getting rid of **John** Payne. That guy had a certain class and brought excitement to what had become a dull band. Old school fans will take to 'Gravitas' with ease, whilst the rest of us will feel a familiar deja-vu about the whole thing. It's big, grandiose and very,

decided to re-release the first three albums from that most revered of AOR outfits, **Toto**. Despised in the mainstream press, Steve Lukather and company have ridden the storm and stuck two fingers up at their detractors by having a career that spans thirty-five years. In that time they've grabbed Grammy awards, suffered personal tragedies, had number

overloaded, soul infused AOR was starting to take shape nicely. For many, myself included, this is the jewel in Toto's crown. From the overblown opening of the titular 'Hydra', through to that is 'White Sister', this album covered all the basses. Throw in the soul saturated balladry of '99' and the hard rock ruckus of 'All Us Boys' and you have a perfect example of this band in all their early glory. A very underappreciated album, one that I would place higher than 'Isolation' and 'The Seventh One', it's

Starting the eighties by releasing your least commercially viable album and then having your singer (Bobby Kimball) busted for allegedly selling drugs, was not the most auspicious o starts to the decade. Releasing 'Turn Back' in early '81, it was evident from the likes of 'Gift With A Golden Gun' and 'English Eyes' that the band had toughened their sound, stripped it back almost to the point of losing their identity This was a band in transition from their pompously overblown origins, to teetering on the brink of commerciality and the success that would come with their fourth album. The likes of 'Goodbye Elenore' was heed to their seventies roots, whilst 'If It's The Last Night' hinted at their imminent commerciality. Also on the label this month is the rock 'n' raunch of Dirty Looks' 'Cool From The Wire' album. Having released an EP and three albums, they were signed by Atlantic and put into a studio with Max Norman. The resulting album is often regarded as one of the finest of its type. Not to dissimilar to Kix, Dirty Looks had that AC/DC vibe down to a

tee and built a career out of delivering down and dirty hard rock to the youth of America. The Immeasurably talented Alain

Concepcion is the kind of AOR artist that could go quite far. He released an EP awhile back, which was most notable for its Benny Mardones cover and is just about to release his debut album, 'R'. It's packed full of the kind of AOR that fans of David Saylor will adore. I mean, just check out the album's opener, 'If I'm Losing You', for all the proof you'll need. He does like his covers, as tracks from Journey Michael McDonald and Luther Vandross will testify, but let's take nothing away from this talented AOR star, as 'R' is a slick, gold-plated albur that is rich in talent and has class in abundance. There have been several classy releases from Spain recently; this will sit nicely at the top of the pile

Austrian melodic rockers Badhoven have been around for quite a life as Black Rose, they released two rather non-descript CDs before changing their name to Badhoven in '01, when they released 'Behind The Masquerade Several albums later and they've arrived at their current opus, 'Obsession'. Whils I've never been a massive fan of this outfit, I've always admired their spirit and dedication to their cause. If I'm honest, I was expecting very little from this album but I have to add that it took me totally by surprise. It's certainly their best work by a country mile; it's also quite possibly one of the best AOR CDs to come from an Austrian band. The likes of 'She's So Beautiful', 'My Brothers Red Guitar' and 'Rock You Hard' are prime examples of a band at the top of their game. Have a look at www.badhoven.com
